Families...we must do more

Thanks to the generosity of our many Friends, including to the FHL Emergency Family Support Appeal, we've been able to channel \$29,000 for the care of the most needy Christians in Gaza. But the increasing pressures on the Christians of both Gaza and the West Bank mean that we can't help all the people who need our help.



'This is the first FHL newsletter to carry a direct appeal for more money on our front page', said Jim Quinn, FHL's Chairman. 'But these are very difficult times in the Holy Land, so we ask you to start 2015 with a resolution to do all you can to raise the money we need to help more Christian families.'

On 24th November Peter Rand, FHL Vice Chairman, and our Founder Patron, Cardinal Vincent Nichols, handed a donation to Fr Jorge Hernandez, the Parish Priest of Holy Family Church in Gaza. The first contribution from the FHL Emergency Appeal we launched in August, after the terrible damage of the war became clear, is \$29,000. It's being spent on the *Oratorio* psycho-social support programme for the children of the parish and school-fees for the poorest children, to help their lives return to normal as soon as possible, and on essential repairs to homes.

Peter Rand's visit to Gaza, his second since FHL decided early in 2014 to extend support to the area, coincided with the Westminster Diocese Pilgrimage to the Holy Land led by Cardinal Nichols. Peter was able to join the Cardinal and the Latin Patriarch, His Beatitude Fouad Twal, at Mass in Holy Family Church, and to review the great work being done by the churches in Gaza.

'One very poignant feature of life in Gaza since the war is the number of families whose homes have been so badly damaged that they can't keep their children with them' said Peter. 'The orphanages have taken many children in, but they're now full, and under great pressure. It's a real tragedy.' Peter writes more on his recent visits to Gaza inside this issue.

Chairman's message



Friends of the Holy Land is now five years old, and it's time to look back over those extraordinary years and look forward.

Since our foundation in 2009 FHL has grown from a shared vision of helping the Christian people of the Holy Land to the reality of life as a busy, committed, influential charity working in a very difficult field and faced with ever-increasing demands. It's been a wonderful, if challenging, experience for everyone involved, and I pay tribute to the many people who've helped FHL raise over £1.5 million for much-needed projects in the Holy Land. Thank you all.

Thanks to you there's also greater awareness now of the difficulties faced by the Christians of the Holy Land, and of FHL as a force for good, an organisation that knows what to do and how to do it. It's brought us new Friends, and the warm support of the Bishops in the Anglican and Catholic churches of England and Wales. We have also played a small part in developing ecumenism both here and in the Holy Land.

Five years ago our founders, led by Dr Michael Whelan, set out the four objectives you'll see on the front page, and we remain true to them. We still concentrate on work in education, employment, health and housing, and now offer regular support to families in serious difficulty because of unemployment or poor health. Our founders adopted a policy of avoiding the politics of the region so we can carry on our essential work in very difficult circumstances. The greatly increased tensions of today make us even more grateful for that far-sighted decision.

However difficult life was for Christians in the Holy Land in 2009, it's become even more difficult. The Middle East is more complex, more divided and more tense than ever, and the needs of the Christian people of the Holy Land grow daily. In 2014 we decided to extend our help to Gaza, and the war that took place soon after has greatly increased demand for our help.

Now we have to grow and raise even more money, and new groups from Jersey to Galloway, in Scotland, have taken up the challenge. Please do what you can to increase your efforts for the Christians of the Holy Land; they've never been in greater need than today. Finally, I send you all my very best wishes, and my warm thanks for all you do.

Our two senior Patrons have each sent a message to mark FHL's anniversary.

Congratulations to Friends of the Holy Land on reaching its fifth birthday. Well done everyone!

More importantly, I offer my sincere thanks to everyone involved in the work of Friends of the Holy Land for all that has been achieved over these five years. There is much to be celebrated and much for which we can be thankful. One is the great efforts of Michael Whelan, who did so much to drive the 'Friends' from the word 'go'. Then there is the great step of Friends of the Holy Land evolving as an ecumenical venture with the clear support of Archbishop Rowan Williams and now of Archbishop Justin Welby.

Any visitor to the Holy Land can see, in Palestine, the real fruit of this work. I was privileged to see that for myself last November and to realise the immense potential there is for more projects to bear great fruit for a hard-pressed people. In Gaza, too, I was able to see the gratitude of the parish for the support it is receiving from Friends of the Holy Land.

So my thanks to all! My thanks, personally, to all who contributed to the collection for the Friends of the Holy Land marking my appointment as Cardinal. That was a tremendous effort for which I am so grateful.

Happy birthday, Friends, and long may your good work continue.

FHL's dynamic Friends

This issue features Pat Revans, of Wallasey, in the Diocese of Shrewsbury, a formidable and energetic Friend. Pat, a member of the Knights of the Holy Sepulchre, was at Liverpool Metropolitan Cathedral for the launch of FHL in November 2009, and it was the words of the Latin Patriarch, His Beatitude Fouad Twal, that led Pat to joining FHL. Now he gives pulpit presentations across the North West as one of FHL's Ambassadors, and is a leading light in the busy FHL Groups and Parishes of Shrewsbury Diocese.

'Our fundraising events in north east Wirral are very effective - we had a Hot Pot Supper and Auction in early December that raised £1,888 in one evening, and with donations on the evening the total is over £2,500. Our next event will be a Ceilidh on 16th January, and I know that will be a really good evening. It's fun to fundraise!'

'After meeting them while on pilgrimage, I'm greatly inspired by the forbearance of the older Christians who have stayed in the Holy Land despite the countless difficulties they face each day – their spirituality, their ability to turn the other cheek with dignity, is a huge example to me', he said. 'Parishioners right across the Shrewsbury Diocese have been so enthusiastic for FHL and Holy Land pilgrimages. Last year our pilgrimage filled three coaches, and we're already well on the way to selling out the next one, in October 2015.'

Our Jersey Group is thriving

Deacon Iain MacFirbhisigh has told us that the Jersey Group founded in 2014 by the Anglican, Catholic and other churches of the island has already raised over £5,000. They've held several fundraising events, including a Sponsored Slim, Silent Auction and Crib Collections, and received donations from the Rotary Club of Jersey and the Catenians. Well done!

Fundraising in 2015

Lent is a time for fasting and giving alms, so make a Lenten Appeal for FHL through your parish. Here are some good Lenten fundraising ideas from one of FHL's Kenilworth volunteers, June Palmer.

A Blessing Each Day - for adults;

We'll provide a Calendar for Lent through FHL's website, with facts about the plight of Christians in the Holy Land and inviting donations for the blessings that we have in this country.

And for children;

We'll provide a sheet through our web-site looking at the plight of Christian children in the Holy Land and inviting children to write down one blessing that they have received each day during Lent. At Easter time their families will return these to their parish with a donation for FHL. The children's sheets can then be put in a spiral binder and displayed in the Parish until Pentecost.

Miss a Meal - ask everyone who can to miss one meal a week and make a donation to FHL. (Of course, some people may prefer to make a donation *not* to skip a meal!)

Lenten Lunch - prepare a simple Lenten lunch in the Parish, run a raffle and promote FHL's work for the Christians of the Holy Land. The new FHL film will be a great help in telling FHL's story.

FHL in the Holy Land

More demands on FHL than ever

On his second visit to the West Bank and Gaza this year Peter Rand, FHL's Vice Chairman, noticed a number of changes that are likely to affect FHL's work there.

'First is the impact on local employment of the 2014 war in Gaza. The Palestine Authority's Tourism Minister Rula Ma'ay'a has said that by early December the war had caused a \$30 million loss in revenue to the Palestinian economy.'



'Although most UK pilgrimages still took place, there was a 60% cancellation rate overall, with many US, German and Scandinavian pilgrims staying at home. This has had a marked impact on the Palestinian economy, already heavily dependent on travel and tourism', said Peter.

'It soon became obvious that this has affected jobs right across the board, not just in those directly involved in travel and hospitality, but their suppliers as well. It's caused problems for many families all around the Holy Land. And security concerns have grown as the chances of a sustainable peace have faded, leading to more emigration'.

'The persecution of Christians in neighbouring countries like Iraq and Syria has also increased the fears of the Christians of Palestine, and has started to affect their relationships with their neighbours. At the same time, the Christian response to the 2014 war has enhanced its standing. From the start the churches and Christian institutions opened their doors to anyone who needed shelter.'

'In general the people leaving Palestine are the best educated, the most talented, the better-off, the young, people who could form the basis of a really strong, thriving and resilient Christian community.'

'But the increased tensions across the region have led to even more requests for our help, especially as after five years working there we're now recognised as a significant source of practical support to local Christians. Sadly we've had to start prioritising the most urgent and needy cases, and even deferring requests for help and rationing our involvement in some areas. For example, we were able to increase our educational support from 60 to 180 children and students in 2014, but we can't increase numbers in 2015. And in 2014 we decided to discontinue the Christmas donations to families that have been a feature of FHL's work since we started.'

'This means that we all have to do more to help if we are to continue the work begun by Michael Whelan, Cardinal Nichols and the other founder members five years ago. It's worth all the effort, though, to know that our help is valued and appreciated, and that FHL is making a significant difference to the Christians of the Holy Land.'

School of Joy

In the five years that FHL has supported the School of Joy for children with special educational needs our support has allowed the School to grow from three classes and 30 children to six classes and 62 children. The School does great things for the many disadvantaged children in its care, and of course we'll continue to support it in 2015.



In November Bishop Declan Lang, Chairman of the International Affairs Department of the Catholic Bishops' Conference of England and Wales, and Dr David Ryall, its Secretary and a valued friend and Trustee of FHL, visited the School of Joy, where they met the children and its Director, Fr Mamdouh AbuSada.

FHL in the Holy Land

FHL family support

We continue to help Christian families with problems, and by December 2014 we were supporting 52 families facing exceptional hardship because of unemployment or poor health.

On Peter's last visit he met George, a little boy of five suffering from a complex medical condition that means he has to live on a special, and expensive,



milk substitute product called Neocate, dispensed by a machine. FHL has been helping his family with the cost for some time. With his diet under control George is now able to go to school with his older sister, and he's doing well.

Another problem is poor housing, and Peter Rand saw several houses needing urgent work to make them fit for the winter. One was this house, with a very leaky flat roof and unhealthily damp, mouldy



rooms on both floors. The provision of reasonable housing has always been one of FHL's priorities, and we've funded essential repairs to several homes identified by our Holy Land Committee.

St Martha's House

The House is again full, with 42 local elderly ladies going there twice a week for social time together and a good meal. We've been supporting SMH since we began, and it's run on a tight budget by our good friend Laila Asfoura, who continues to look for new projects to support the local community.

FRESH in Bethlehem

We continue to hear good things about FRESH, the new enterprise in Bethlehem making quality food for local shops, offices and schools. Their latest venture is cup-cakes, and the chocolate ones passed the Bishop Declan Lang 'taste test' with flying colours.



Looking ahead

For some time Laila has seen a Christian Hospice, possibly run by a religious order, as another major contribution to the welfare of the Christian community of the West Bank. There has been no hospice in the region, and as younger people emigrate and leave more elderly people without their traditional family support network, there is a rapidly growing need for care for the elderly and especially for palliative care.

This will be a costly and complicated project, though you'll agree it's worth taking on, and if any Friend has specific experience in setting up and running a hospice we'd like to hear from you.

Archbishop Suheil Dawani

We were very pleased to learn of the appointment of our friend Bishop Suheil Dawani as Archbishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem, and we wrote to congratulate him and wish him well.

Although relatively small in membership, the Episcopal Church is immensely active in the Holy Land. There are 27 parishes in five countries, centered on the Cathedral Church of St. George the Martyr in Jerusalem. The church supports 33 institutions, including hospitals, clinics, kindergartens and schools, vocational training programmes and institutions for the deaf, the disabled and the elderly.

Beit Sahour housing project

Just like planning authorities and lawyers in the UK, their counterparts in Palestine take their time, and although we're making progress with this important project it's moving slowly. We're now waiting for the transfer of ownership of the land and the contract to build to be completed. We'll keep you informed as this vital project progresses.



Meanwhile our Founder Patron Cardinal Nichols visited the site when he was in Palestine leading the Westminster Diocese Pilgrimage, and told Peter Rand how impressed he is with FHL's plans for the development of affordable apartments here. Bethlehem office

The recent opening of our Holy Land office has already improved our systems. Reem (left) and Nancy visit people referred to us and advise us



on how we can best help. It's proving to be a quick and effective approach, and helps ensure that our funds go where they're most needed.

Fr Jamal Khader

Chairman of the FHL Holy Land Committee, Fr Jamal is Rector of the Latin Seminary in Beit Jala. We were touched by what he wrote on the occasion of our fifth anniversary, and we'd like you to read it. He wrote *'FHL has made real change in the lives of many Christian families in the Holy Land. Although it began only five years ago, FHL's work and assistance is felt by many needy families in various ways - school or university fees, restoration of houses, medical expenses, monthly assistance to needy families and more. The local committee of the FHL volunteer to assess the needs, respond to urgent calls for help and make sure that assistance is given to the most needy. In the next five years we plan to organize our work in a better way, so we can reach more of the poorest and most vulnerable. What is specific about FHL is the direct contact with people and the change we make in their lives, so they can live in dignity and meet their needs. This is our way to help the living stones of the Holy Land and this is our mission.'*
